Weeds, weeds, and more weeds (continued)

After a well-deserved hiatus for a couple of weeks, we are back at it with weed abatement on the range. For those who have



adopted a lane please do your part in keeping the range shootable. For those who are on the range and notice anything that needs addressed (hay bales, targets shot out, weeds on target lanes, etc.) please let a Board Member know and we'll get it addressed.

As we have a small group of dedicated volunteers literally killing themselves weekend after weekend to keep your range shootable, we have made the investment in a heavy-duty flail mower. We've rented these and they do a great job clearing the fence-line and anywhere the weeds are 6-7' tall. This weekend will be the maiden voyage of CVAs mower, and we are considering the purchase of a second one next year.

We have looked into using goats on the range for weed abatement. Once the vendor told us the price (~2x what we purchased our new mower for!), we passed on the idea.

We have also made contact with two organizations that provide manpower for weed abatement to public organizations. One passed on assisting us, and the other was prohibitively expensive. We are continuing to look at options on outsourcing the weed abatement tasks on the range. As more information comes to light we will report out during the General Meetings and Quiver articles. Bryan Tanger, our 3D Range Captain is back from vacation and will be working to abate the jungle on the 3D range. For those who enjoy shooting 3D the range will be back to its normal excellent condition very soon.

CVA has passed its inspection with Ventura County, thanks Cathy and Bonnie for meeting the county supervisor last month. Feedback is that our range meets expectations and we are doing a great job in keeping ahead of the weed issue.

Field Range

Kevin will be in charge of the items listed below under the Field Target Chair section. He will work with Cathy to host pasting parties as needed and will be setting targets on the range prior to each Club Shoot, or as needed based on target condition and member feedback. I really want to thank Kevin for taking on this critical Chair position in the club.

Below is the list of tasks that the Field Target Chair and the Field Range Captain (vacant) are responsible for. We are still looking for a Field Range Captain, so if you are thinking about helping your club please reach out to me or a Board member so we can discuss.

Field Range Captain (Vacant)

- Coordinate with the Field Target Chair to be sure that the Field Range has targets
- Verify hay bales are shootable
 - o Order hay bales as required
 - Band hay bales coordinate work parties to do so
 - Place hay bales as needed coordinate work parties
 - Verify materials (banding and clips) are available and work with the BOD to order any/all materials as needed
- Meet deliveries at the range as schedule permits. Work with the BOD to schedule a club member to meet deliveries as required.
- Be present at BOD and General Meetings as schedule permits. When attendance is not possible, provide a written report via email prior to the BOD meeting.
- Verify range shoot-ability, weed abatement.

- Be the Point of Contact for Range Beatification Days, record and verify Club Member work hours during work activities on the Field Range.
- Work with lane adoptees to maintain their adopted lane(s)
- Maintain the list of adopted lanes. Work with the BOD to communicate any changes to the list
- Schedule work parties as required for weed abatement if necessary, beyond the normally scheduled Range Beautification Days
- Work to keep the Tool and Target bins clear, clean, and organized

Field Target Chair (Kevin Knebel)

- Paste Targets for the Field
 - Verify materials target paste, rollers, drop cloths, cardboard, and targets are available
 - Schedule "pasting parties" in coordination with Cathy / BOD
- Work with the BOD to order materials as needed.
- Place appropriate targets on the field butts (28) based on NFAA requirements at a monthly cadence
- Be present at BOD and General Meetings as schedule permits. When attendance is not possible, provide a written report via email prior to the BOD meeting.

Tom and everyone that helps him will be available to train the new Range Captains, so don't think you'll be dumped into the deep end without a flotation device! If you are interested, please reach out to me or contact any board member. Your club needs YOU!

FROM THE DESK OF THE VP

Hi Folks,

This article may seem very familiar! That is because it is so important that I republish it every July. Please take this info to heart. We want everyone to stay safe on the range and return home to your family and friends.



With the heat coming on fast a furious now I'd like to make sure I do a reminder about the simple concept of making sure you hydrate when shooting or working on the range. During these upcoming very hot, humid days we can easily forget how quickly heat exhaustion can take place.

In general, when a person works in a hot environment, the body must get rid of excess heat to maintain a stable internal temperature. It does this mainly through circulating blood to the skin and through sweating. When the air temperature is close to, or warmer than normal body temperature, cooling of the body becomes more difficult and blood circulated to the skin cannot lose its heat. Sweating then becomes the main way the body cools off. But sweating is effective only if the humidity level is low enough to allow evaporation and if the fluids and salts that are lost are adequately replaced.

If the body cannot get rid of excess heat, it will store it. When this happens, the body's core temperature rises and the heart rate increases. As the body continues to store heat, the person begins to lose concentration and has difficulty focusing on a task, may become irritable or sick, and often loses the desire to drink. The next stage is most often fainting if the person is not cooled down. Excessive exposure to heat can cause a range of heat related illnesses from heat rash and heat cramps to heat exhaustion and

heat stroke. Heat stroke can result in death and requires immediate medical attention.

The chart below from the Department of Labor is an excellent guideline for what you should be looking for in yourself and those around you. It's important to remember that these levels can escalate VERY quickly. If you are alone, you can go from Heat Rash to Heat Exhaustion very quickly and it is at that time that your brain starts to shuts down. If you are alone, then mistakes and poor judgment can be life threatening.

ELECTIONS INFORMATION

It seems like it is a way off still, but we must start planning for the end of the club year and upcoming elections. It's all about the requirements of the timing of voting and making sure we are ready for ballots to be received back for counting at the September General Membership Meeting which means that final nominations will be accepted at the August meeting and ballots will be mailed out at that time. This means that through June and July we are looking for a nomination committee to reach out to the membership.

Nomination Procedure. The President is responsible for appointing a nomination committee, consisting of 3 or more members, not less than two (2) months prior to the annual meeting to be held each September. (June-July) It is the duty of the nominating committee to nominate one or more candidates for each office and the three (3) expiring seats on the Board of Directors. The proposed nominees should be announced at the August general meeting. During this meeting, nominations may also be made from the floor by any senior member. Nominees must have been a member of the Club for at least one (1) year and must accept the nomination to be put on the ballot. The membership will elect the officers and directors so nominated at the September General Meeting, or at any special meeting of the members called by the Board of Directors. A member in good standing may be nominated for one (1) or more offices but can accept only one (1) nomination for any elected position.

<u>Tenure in Office</u>. The officers of this Club shall be elected each year and shall take office the first meeting in October. Officers shall hold office for one year and until their successors are elected and installed in office. Directors shall be elected for staggered two (2) year terms; three (3) in each even numbered year (to be served during the ensuing odd numbered year), and three (3) in each odd numbered year (to be served during the ensuing even numbered year.



FIELD RANGE -TARGET CLEARANCE PROTOCOLS

(First Draft)

We have recently had interest in the protocols for adopting a lane! Here is a complete breakdown of how maintenance is expected. Realize that we do have lanes available for adoption as of this writing. Please reach out to Kurt Hoberg to verify what lane you would like to adopt. First come first served! This is a great opportunity to get in many volunteer hours towards any membership requirements.

Note: This is for FIELD RANGE ONLY

Everyone adopting a lane has the responsibility to keep the lane clear of all ground weeds and obstructions so that the lane is maintained on a continual basis and is clean and functional at all times based on the following protocols.

- 1. All ground weeds must be cleared from the road area to the shooting stakes and from the shooting stakes to the bales based on the following guidelines:
 - a) There should be at least a one-foot clearance on both sides of the lane, i.e. outside of the furthest shooting stake.
 - b) Lane weed clearance must also be evaluated from all shooting stakes to the full target area so that a target placed anywhere on the bales is fully visible without any plant obstruction. From all shooting stake positions there should be no obstructions in the site line or arrow path.
 - c) Arrow flight paths must also be taken into account, such as where a high branch is above the direct sight line to the bale but could obstruct the arch of an arrow path.
 - d) The far-left shooting stakes must be clear to shoot at the farleft edge of the bales and the far-right stakes must be clear to shoot at the far-right edge of the bales.

- 2. Behind the bales should also be completely free of any weeds to a distance that a shooter is easily able to stand behind the bale and work or pull arrows, 3 feet is a good guideline for around and behind the bales.
- The catch area or berm behind the bales should also be free of weeds and obstructions. This berm area is dependent on the setup of each lane and more particular questions should be addressed to the range captain or club president.
- 4. The connecting Walking Path that leads to the next lane should be cleared, 4 foot across, all the way to the road or to the next shooting stakes. If the path includes steps see number 6 below.
- 5. The bow rack, i.e. where you hang your bow while extracting your arrows, needs to have a clear path to it that is 3 feet wide, and 3 feet around the rack.
- 6. If the target has steps, those steps must be clear of all brush, be as level as possible, no less than 10 inches deep and no more than 12 inches high. They should be reinforced with pipe type retainers to prevent erosion from weather and use conditions. If steps need major repair, report this to the Range Captain or the Board so that appropriate costs can be addressed and repair work scheduled.

Please note:

- A. Lane clearing is as much a functional process as it is an aesthetic one. It is important that we always keep in mind the structural stability of the areas and common sense will dictate some of the process such as slope of a lane.
- B. As each lane has its own particulars, it is recommended that further guidance in respect to clearing processes be discussed with the Field Range Captain or the Club President.

CALIFORNIA DEER HERD SIZE 1911 TO 2016


I recently came across a post on Facebook, placed there by the **CADFW and originated with the link

www.deerfriendly.com. It is a chart of the estimated size of the California deer herd and the history of fluctuation in its numbers from 1911 to 2016, in other words, a hundred years of study by California wildlife scientists.



Thinking that this would be a nice addition to my Bowhunter Education classes, I saved it. After some study and analysis, it appeared to me that it would also be subject of interest to my fellow club members. As an archer you may not necessarily be a hunter, but our attachment to outdoors and wild-places is still very real. Our curiosity about the wildlife around our homes and archery range, etc. is always of some concern. So, let me dissect this chart for you, from my point of view, and see if I can make it make sense to you.

California Deer Population Estimate, 1911 to 2016.



You will not be surprised when I state that major fluctuations of wildlife populations in California coincide with human population booms and busts.

In reading many of the research papers involved with the analysis of the California deer herd decline, one comes away with a lot of the reasons that have contributed to this decline. Listed effects included ineffective forest management practices that eliminated edge effect of forests (not true by the way, clear cutting actually added edges and open spaces for deer food to grow), human consumption of forest products (wood for housing and businesses), misguided environmentalist policy, lack of "cleansing fires" or as we call them "controlled burns" leading to massive forest fires, seem to be the primary culprits. However, droughts, poor predator control, and California's primary buck only hunting regulations were also part of the mix. My point is that all these reasons are just a side effect of the demands placed on the environment by an exploding human growth situation.

Although not registered on our chart above, I think we can certainly assume that the initial damage to California deer herds coincided with the first few major population booms, the Gold Rush (Jan. 24, 1848 - 1855), which also coexisted with emigrant wagon trains along the Oregon and California trails (mid-1840's - mid-1850's) and lastly the completion of the transcontinental railroad (1863-1869). With each major event California's population would double or triple in a matter of a few short years. This put a heavy burden on the need for venison to feed the masses.

Back in 1911, so many (perhaps the majority) of Californian's were living in rural areas involved in agriculture. Land that was at one time natural habitat for wildlife and shared with native Americans, now is at the mercy of the plow. Emigrants regularly depended on wildlife (in particular deer) as table fare, it was not sport or interest in hunting, it was a simple necessity. Add the taking of game by the emigrants to the annual take by remaining native Americans and you can visualize a decline in the size of the deer herd. Something needed to happen to reverse the decline. The California Department of Fish & Game was formed in 1909 to begin the process of study, of managed wildlife populations and human hunting and fishing regulations.

Still California had few hunting regulations or wardens to enforce rules in

1916, while hundreds of thousands of new acres were being changed from natural game habitat to productive farms every year. When **CADF&G (now CADFW) was started, it was in response to the obvious lack of wild game that rural dependency, city consumption and farming practice had created. The need to take some control, to attempt to alter the situation before extinction became a reality, was the goal. The deer herd state wide was down from several million to an estimate of approximately 150,000.



The first order of business came in 1917, when all deer hunting was suspended to give deer a chance at recovery until 1926. Many predators had been eliminated by farmers to protect farm animals and the deer herd began to grow. The fact that we were also involved in WWI helped, as most young males were away fighting in Europe. Upon the return of the WWI doughboys, hunting again became a popular pastime.

The Great Depression and the Great Dust Bowl (1929 - 1939) were a double whammy of deep trouble. Many Americans headed west where land was still fertile, creating more farms, increasing population in the Golden State and in turn putting more pressure on our deer herd. In 1931 a sharp drop in herd size was again noticed. During the early thirties, game management was a new science and struggled with a lack of knowledge. By 1936 (to1941) some progress was made with predator control, deer habitat management and regulation enforcement. The late thirties into the early forties was a good period with wildlife management policy beginning to have a positive effect. It was short-lived however.

WWII was now in progress and the young men were again away at war, deer growth again began to drop. The reason, with the young men off to war there was no one around to take advantage of the recently instituted predator control programs, (bounties on mountain lions and coyotes) and the herds again began to decline.

During the 1940's, California became aware that more scientific knowledge was needed if they were to have an effective game management program. Aldo Leopold* and another naturalist/biologist named Longhurst were hired to estimate the current state wide herd size, to suggest management technique, and to estimate the future growth. This period began the start of truly effective game management practice.

From 1947 to 1952, we had the largest deer herd growth in state history, resulting in an estimated deer herd of two million. A lot of this had to do with new hunting regulations/seasons and the growth of hunters that returned home from WWII to pay the bill. Effective predator control programs (where bounties on mountain lions and coyotes were in effect), resulted in a much larger fawn survival rate. New habitat management programs, and modern wildlife management were a success. The effect of the Korean War (1950 - 1953) was also helpful in keeping young men out of the field.

In 1961 we began to see the start of a major decline in California's deer herd size. This correlates with the massive growth of the California suburbs (think San Fernando Valley, Simi Valley, etc.), due to the new Eisenhower interstate freeway and highway systems. This program was very successful at making California a great place for people to succeed in, but the continuing loss of game habitat due to massive population growth, is still the major reason for the wildlife decline that plagues us to this day. By 1976, we see a short burst of growth due to a combination of more modern game management

programs and a drop in hunter numbers. Older hunters dropping out and younger adults choosing more urban activities, help control the deer herd decline throughout the 1980's. Still continued population growth caused habitat loss at a rate that could not be kept up with.

In 1990 we have two major problems that begin to decimate our deer herd to dangerously low levels. First, Proposition 117, passed by the non-hunting people of California, was responsible for ending the control of mountain lions by scientific wildlife management practices, again resulting in dismal fawn survival rates. Following prop117, were two long droughts that concentrated deer to nearby limited water sources making them easier prey for predators. The end result of the three barriers (urban sprawl, prop 117 and drought) means the herd size has been reduced now from a two million deer high to less than 500,000. If this continues, herd size could soon to be nearly back to where we started in 1916. Hopefully the break in droughts will help us resist any further decline in herd size, at least for a while. It needs to be said that with the amount of the land needs of the current California population that not enough deer habitat remains to handle a deer herd much larger than the current estimate of 450,000.


This seems to be the first generation where California has begun to decline in population, should this continue it could be a possible benefit to wildlife.

Starting in 1947 California's organized archers have taken a very active and effective role in the deer management work with the Department of Fish & Wildlife through their state bowhunting organization the California Bowmen Hunters State Archery Association (CBH/SAA).

You will notice that nowhere in this analysis have I included hunters as part of the problem. Hunters in this state were never a majority, even in 1916***, and today they make up only approximately 1.5% of the population. If it were not for the hunters, and their involvement in wildlife management and their dollars, this disastrous decline in the deer herd would have never survived the 1920's, prop 117 side effects, or the habitat loss due to human growth in California. However, even hunters (who's dollars are the majority financial support of the CADFW) providing the only chance wildlife has of workable protection, can only do so much.

Even though on a nationwide basis, Americas deer herd exceeds the numbers estimated at the time Columbus's arrival, only in California do we have a deer herd population in distress.

The success rates of California hunters are between 3% locally and 19% in the very best of areas, is the worst success rate in the entire country. Should hunters and hunting continue its current decline of participation in California,

who will save the wildlife, who will pay the bill? If no other method of income is designed beyond hunters' dollars and concern, the game we love to watch will surely suffer the most.

*** Sport hunters have always been a small portion of California's population, even in 1916 the majority of deer harvested was not by or for sport hunting, but subsistence hunting for family table fare. By the way "table fare" is the motivation even for the sport hunter.

FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDENT

Public Session Work Party

We had a very successful work party at the Public Session this month on Saturday the 10th. I want to thank everyone that signed up and came out to help - per our signup WEB page over 60 CVA members volunteered to assist.



We compressed, banded, and placed 130 bales on the Public Session range. The 5M, 10M, and 18M bales were all replaced, as well as the bales for the 20-40Y targets. The overage of bales (~30) was moved to the Field Range and will be used to replace the bales on the practice lane, date TBD. The 10M line has been extended due to more shooters at that distance.

We rented a bobcat and three trash bins. All the old, decomposing bales behind the 5M line have been thrown out, as well as the leaning pyramid of arrow-eating bales behind the 90M target. The driveway into the PS range has been shored up with additional dirt that had been lost due to erosion using the dirt that was piled up behind the 5M line.

The PS bin is going through reorganization. The old, too-big shelf at the end of the bin has been removed and the bin is prepped for new shelving and bow storage. All bows have been pulled, cleaned, strings inspected and waxed, arrow rests replaced, organized, and put back in the bin. Arrows have been repaired and sorted.

The kitchen has new lighting and power. The outside of the kitchen was power washed, along with the benches and patio area. The inside of the bin was scrubbed in preparation for sanding the floor. We will be sealing the roof, replacing the fans, and putting the kitchen back together during a future work party. Weeds were cleared from the Valley West bin to the fence line with the flail mover.

Thanks to Jim Pellerino for serving an amazing BBQ lunch to all our hard working CVA members.

Due to the large number of volunteers, all this was all done in less than 9 hours.

 - Maintain the list of adopted lanes. Work with the BOD to communicate any changes to the list
 - Schedule work parties as required for weed abatement if necessary, beyond the normally scheduled Range Beautification Days
- Work to keep the Tool and Target bins clear, clean, and organized

There is no reason to drive fast in the park.

As I do every month, I would like to remind all members to close and lock the CVA gate behind you when you enter the range and be sure to secure and lock the gate when you leave, this includes both the main range entrance and the gate to the Tournament Range. I've lost count the number of times I've personally secured the gate during the weekend and weekdays. We have had vandalism occur – keeping the range secure helps keep the possibility down.



CHANGES TO CLUB BY-LAWS TO ACCOMMODATE ONLINE VOTING

Nominations and Elections

Section 1. Nomination Procedure. The President is responsible for appointing a nomination committee, consisting of 3 or more members, not less than two (2) months prior to the annual meeting to be held each September. It is the duty of the nominating committee to nominate one or more candidates for each office and the three (3) expiring seats on the Board of Directors. The proposed nominees should be announced at the August general meeting. During this meeting, nominations may also be made from the floor by any senior member. Nominees must have been a member of the Club for at least one (1) year and must accept the nomination to be put on the ballot. The membership will elect the officers and directors so nominated at the September General Meeting, or at any special meeting of the members called by the Board of Directors. A member in good standing may be nominated for one (1) or more offices but can accept only one (1) nomination for any elected position

Section 2. <u>Counting of Ballots</u>. Following the nominations at the August meeting, the Election of Officers and Directors will proceed as **provided under Article X of this Constitution**. The time for the counting of the ballots shall not be later than the date of the Annual Meeting in September. A nominee on the ballot for an office shall not assist in counting ballots.

Section 3. <u>Tie Votes</u>. In case of a tie vote, the issue shall be determined by lot.

Section 4. <u>Tenure in Office</u>. The officers and directors of this Club shall be elected each year in the manner provided in Section 1 of this Article and shall take office the first meeting in October. Officers shall hold office for one year and until their successors are elected and installed in office. Directors shall be elected for staggered two (2) year terms; three (3) in each even numbered year (to be served during the ensuing odd numbered year), and three (3) in each odd numbered year (to be served during the ensuing even numbered year.

Article X

<u>Voting</u>

Section 1. <u>Voting by Mail Procedure</u>. A matter to be submitted to the vote of the members, including the Election of Officers and Directors, may be submitted to the members by mail at any time the Board of Directors may deem it necessary. The ballot sent to the membership shall state the issue or issues and/or each candidate and the office for which he or she is a candidate, and the time and place for counting the ballots. Each member shall find enclosed in the envelope mailed to them the following:

- A. A small unmarked envelope.
- B. A larger return-addressed envelope marked 'Ballot'.
- C. A ballot with the following information printed at top of said ballot:

(Voting Procedure)

- 1) After marking your ballot, place it into the unmarked envelope and seal it.
- Place the sealed unmarked envelope into the larger returnaddress envelope and seal it. Family Memberships holding two votes can place both individually sealed ballots into one mailing envelope.
- 3) Print or label your name and address on the upper left-hand corner and mail it.
- 4) The printed names on the outside of the return-addressed envelope will be checked against the paid-up membership files.

Be sure they are legible. If your name(s) and address is not on the outside of the large envelope, your ballot will not be counted.

Added Section for Review

Section 2. <u>Voting On-line Procedure</u>. A matter to be submitted to the vote of the members, including the Election of Officers and Directors, may be submitted to the members via a secure, on-line voting site. The site to be used will be confidential and left to the discretion of the Board.

Any items up for voting will be presented to the Membership via email presentation and/or promoted through any communication deemed necessary by the Board. All communications will include a complete detailed procedure for the process being used and will state opening and closing date and time of any election or voting procedure.

All results will be presented to the Membership in a timely manner, via email or at any General Meeting or as deemed appropriate to the subject matter.

All Members will be requested to provide an individual email for these procedures. Family Memberships will be asked to provide two separate emails to provide two votes for their membership. All Members will be encouraged to use this option. Any Member without on-line access will have an "opt out" option if needed and will be provided an appropriate, secured, alternate method to vote if requested.





CONTROLED BREATH AND THE SHOT

A column for the "Conejo Quiver" by Curtis Hermann -August 2019

"It doesn't matter if you win or lose -Until you lose!" Lanny Basham author of "With Winning in Mind"



Controlled breathing is an important technique used in all forms of shooting sports to help improve and maintain accuracy. I came across this reality early in life as a shooter of BB guns, pellet rifle and a single shot 22 rifle. I can still hear the words today, "take a full but relaxed breath, slowly let out 2/3 to 3/4 of the air, hold, aim and squeeze the trigger, exhale gently. Lots of small game fell to that process (to the delight of my Mother who always liked to have a little something extra for the evening meal).

Attending Natrona County high school in Casper, Wyoming my junior year, I enlisted in the ROTC* program. I liked the Eisenhower WWII style uniforms, plus I could join the rifle team and the drill team, fun I thought! At the tryouts, I was chosen as Captain of the rifle team. We shot Olympic style target 22's and all of us (as country boys) were pretty good shooters. Our coach was an exmilitary drill sergeant, so we became the top team and held the state championship for the next two years. He really pushed us on breathing technique, it really helped.

I don't remember when I first consciously tried to use this method in an archery shooting routine. I suspect that to some degree, due to my very early training, that it was instinctively always a part of my process. However, as I advanced to heavier weight hunting bows, bad habits began to arise.

A beautiful day in Malibu, the "Zone -A" early season hunt was on. I approached the crest of a small but steep knoll and caught this nice

buck as he rose out of his bed and disappeared around the edge of the knoll. Leaping into high gear, I sped to the top of that knoll, sure I was going to get a shot as he circled to the other side. Sure enough, he was exactly where I expected him to be. My Martin "Cougar Magnum" compound set at 70 pounds came up as I placed my broadhead tipped arrow on the string. I'm out of breath from my run up the knoll and as I try to draw to make my "gimme shot," the string just won't budge! I try again and fail, the buck is gone, my hands are on my knee's as I wheeze and I try to catch my breath! A hard lesson was learned that day!

Still, I struggle today, it is so easy to start to draw the bow as you inhale and then when your lungs are full, you hold your breath and try to make the shot. This is a recipe for less than desirable shooting performance. Yes, you will make many good shots, usually the first arrow of the round, by the fourth arrow things are not as good.


What happens in this routine is not good. Holding your breath when your lungs are full introduces tension in the chest area, it also does not allow for a relaxed aiming process. When under tension of holding a set of lungs full of air, your brain is telling you, what you really want to do is exhale, and aiming therefore is rushed! Secondly, when you miss your shot (one you know you should have made), the tension makes you want to reload *fast* and make a second shot, (which will also likely fail to hit where you want). It is a bad self-perpetuating cycle!

So today, out at the range with the guys doing our normal practice round, I tried working on and analyzing my breathing routine. Working on form is extremely hard to do well in a social situation, distractions are many, such as "Oh s#\$%! Tom just hit Rob's arrow, just as I try to focus on anchor, aim and follow through. Overall, it did work pretty well, learning to tune out the distractions is all part of the game. As an instinctive archer, I'm not sure my exact routine will work for you, and none of this is set in stone, and self-designing a routine that works for you is what is best. Do feel free to use my way as a starting point or guideline.

Here's how I do it.

At the shooting stake, I check my stance, raise my bow while focusing on the target. The idea is to get approximate bow hand elevation before the draw begins. While holding the bow in position, I take two full but relaxed breaths. This also has the effect of helping you to get mentally fully into the shot and to shut out distractions.


On the third breath I slowly exhale about one third, during the draw another third is slowly released, at anchor I hold the remaining third as I aim and then relax my string fingers, this triggers the exhale of the remaining air in a relaxed manor. Holding that last third is so much easier than attempting to hold in all that air when your lungs are fully expanded.




It is a pretty simple process, much like my earlier rifle training and a side benefit is that it keeps me from making that rushed second shot if I miss.

A field round is 112 arrows, according to my calculations, I'm successful at this routine about 70% of the time. So, there is room for improvement and I'm sure you can do better!

So many of our club members shoot the public session or are involved in the JOAD program and are used to the intense competition of target archery, and have been taught a breathing routine that they have down pat.



Many of you are also aware of Rick McKinney, an international champion target archer and author of "The Simple Art of Winning." On pages 72-73, he covers the breathing cycle of several champions, (see sidebar), mine most closely resembles that of Ed Eliason.



So, if you have not yet worked on a breathing program, start one, work with the advice of CVA coaches and stick with it, your scores will improve!




Having shot with Rick McKinney before, I can say he is one of the nicest archers you'll ever meet (Ed Eliason as well). Rick won many World Championship & Olympic Medals in his career (Silver Medals in 1988 & 1984 and a Bronze Medal in 1995), and held either Individual and/or Team World Championships Medals in 1975, 1977, 1978, 1979, 1980, 1981, 1983, 1984, 1985, 1995. He was the World Record holder for 90 meters, 70 meters, and 50 meters.

I've had a well-worn copy autographed copy of his book, "The Simple Art of Winning" since it was published in 1996. It is in my opinion, the best book written (ever) on Olympic recurve archery.

SOME COMMONLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: What do I need to do to win one of those awesome Trophy Knives?

A: Our hand engraved custom Trophy Knives are awarded to the individual with the highest scratch (non-handicaped) score, shot during one of the months of the club year, at one of our monthly club shoots (11 of which are available to shoot in). Everyone competes against other archers shooting in the same Division and shooting Style (I.e. Men's Adult Freestyle, or Men's Adult Long Bow, etc.). These trophies are referred to as Range Record Trophies. You

must have shot at least 5 club shoots during the current club year to qualify.

Q: I'm not able to shoot the Club Shoots on Sunday. I understand I can shoot another day of the week. What do I need to do to shoot, receive a handicap, and compete for trophies, etc?

A: That is a great question. You are lucky to be a member of one of the few clubs that allow you to shoot on an alternate day of the week (most clubs insist that you shoot on the same day, which is typically Sunday.) You are allowed to shoot any day <u>after</u> the club tournament, up to and including the Saturday following the club shoot (so, you have seven days in which to shoot). This practice was created initially, because we had some older archers that couldn't physically make it all the way around the course during the Sunday morning. It was decided to allow them to finish up the shoot during the week that followed as long as they followed the rules on score cards and got their score cards to the Tournament Director (John Downey). Since then it was opened up to allow members to participate in our monthly tournaments who routinely attend Church on Sundays. Note: You must shoot on the same targets as everyone else shot on Sunday.

Q: What are the requirements on scorecards?

A: Every archer is responsible for their own score cards. It is up to them to make sure that their cards are properly totaled, signed, and that all pertinent information is included on the card including their Name, Shooting Style (Long Bow, Free Style, Traditional Recurve, etc.), Division (Adult Male, Cub Female, etc.). Every archer should have two score cards that they will turn in (consisting of the card <u>they</u> kept score on, and one that one of their <u>shooting buddies maintained</u> during the round). The tournament director reviews both sets and gives one back to the archer during the morning of the shoot. It is the archer responsibility to get their card set to the Tournament Director. If you shoot on any other day of the week the same rules apply, and it is your responsibility to get your cards to the tournament director by mail. The tournament director maintains the physical cards in case a question comes up later. Each score card must be

signed by the archer, and two other archers in the shooting party. The minimum number of archers in a shooting group in three.

Q: O.K. How do I win one of the Trophy Belt Buckles (Club Champion)?

A: The Club Trophy Belt Buckle is a one of a kind hand-engraved silver buckle that is created for us each year by Silver King in the San Fernando Valley. It is given to the adult archer with the 5 highest handicapped scores. It is typically, but not always, won by one of our Compound Archers shooting Free Style or Bow Hunter Free Style.

We also give a similar belt buckle (with a slightly different design) to the Traditional Archer (non-sight Traditional Recurve or Long Bow) with the highest handicapped score.



What exactly is a handicap and how is it applied to my score?

A: Handicaps are additional points that are applied to the score the archer shoots at one of our club tournaments. It is mathematically determined by taking the average of the last three club shoots shot, then calculating 80 percent of the difference between what was shot and a perfect score (560). That total (points) is then added to the last score shoot (for the third and subsequent club shoots scores). Since it is added to the third score, no one receives a handicap until having shot their third club tournament. As an example, if you shot three scores of 290, 300, and 310, your average for the three would be 300. Eighty percent of the difference between 300 and 560 is equal to = (560 - 300) x 0.8 or **208 points. This is the handicap that is applied to the last score of 310, making a handicapped score of 518 points.**

Q: O.K. ... so why have a handicap at all?

A: Handicaps are used to "equalize" the playing field in much the same way as Golf (otherwise, only the very best high scoring archers would have a chance to win the Club Tournament Trophy. In practice they frequently win it anyway but not always. It turns out that archers whose scores greatly improve over time have a better chance of winning the club trophy. The scores of our very best archers don't vary much over a club year, nor do their handicaps, which is why. As only five handicapped scores are required to win the Club Trophy, this gives the less experienced archer to have a fighting chance. Of course, to have 5 handicapped scores the archer must have shot 7 club tournaments, as you don't pick up a handicap until the third month.

- Meet deliveries at the range as schedule permits. Work with the BOD to schedule a club member to meet deliveries as required.
- Be present at BOD and General Meetings as schedule permits. When attendance is not possible, provide a written report via email prior to the BOD meeting.
- Verify range shoot-ability, weed abatement.
 - Be the Point of Contact for Range Beatification Days, record and verify Club Member work hours during work activities on the Field Range.
 - Work with lane adoptees to maintain their adopted lane(s)
 - Maintain the list of adopted lanes. Work with the BOD to communicate any changes to the list
 - Schedule work parties as required for weed abatement if necessary beyond the normally scheduled Range Beautification Days
- Work to keep the Tool and Target bins clear, clean, and organized

Snakes on the Range

Keep your eyes open! The snakes are out; we have had numerous sightings. Please be sure to keep your eyes on the ground, don't reach blindly under targets and into the weeds searching for arrows, and be sure where you are stepping.

I have posted an <u>informative article</u> on our WEB site about snakes if you are interested in learning more.

Please be careful and exercise common sense while on the range.

Range Security

Please keep your driving speeds down when going through the park. There can be and often are children in the area, and the spot just past the restrooms/showers near the play equipment is always where they seem to dart out onto the road. Stay safe and drive slowly. There is no reason to drive fast in the park.

As I do every month, I would like to remind all members to close and lock the CVA gate behind you when you enter the range and be sure to secure and lock the gate when you leave, this includes both the main range entrance and the gate to the Tournament Range. I've lost count the number of times I've personally secured the gate during the weekend and weekdays. We have had vandalism occur – keeping the range secure helps keep the possibility down.

All club members, please be sure to do your part to secure our range.




Outfitting the Archers Vehicle

A column for the "Conejo Quiver" by Curtis Hermann, Sept. 2019

Prepare for the worst-case scenario to stay out of trouble!

For many years, I got used to a lot of good-natured kidding from my fellow



Here is an example where having a "stuffed" truck and being prepared paid off. At the Fresno Trad shoot the clouds came in early, night fell suddenly as the rain began to soak the entire area. The two options we had were to drive the forty miles back to Fresno in this nasty weather, or spread out our sleeping bags on the bed I had built into the back of the truck. Option number two was an easy choice. So, one long-dark moonless and very cold and rainy night at the Fresno Range found us, (Carl Ward, his son John and myself) comfortably warm and dry in the back of my truck, emergency solved.

Towing a trailer on many vacations, I did have some road or highway issues. One blown trailer tire and on two occasions a leaky radiator and a blown heater hose, all solved with a call to Triple "A" road service. That is the nice thing about motoring today, many times help is but a cell phone call away. But archers are not always in cell phone range or on major roads, we are outdoors people and we can be found in places far out of the normal day to day traffic.

Today, I have a small two-door Jeep Wrangler with very little storage space. Some real thinking had to take place on the downsizing of "stuff" to cover emergencies, there will be no queensized bed in the back. It is a challenge, but I am having fun with getting it properly set up or "prepared" for the unknown.

Of course, every individual or family will have special needs separate from the general run of the mill emergency list. A small kit covering all the special medicines each member of the family needs is an important item. Beyond that, only a little personal tweaking of the points in this column to fit your needs, will give you a nice customized set up.

Archers are outdoor people, in the case of the CVA membership, we are outdoor people who live in wildfire and earthquake country. Outdoor preparedness is probably something you have already addressed. As such, I don't expect this information to be new to you, but may just refresh or add to your existing emergency plans.

Needless to say, start watching the weather report days before your trip, it is just common sense. Knowledge of the expected ten-day weather report can save you from being caught off guard and ill prepared!

Traveling some distance to archery shoots, family vacations, or even that annual or once in a lifetime hunting trip, all require a certain amount of thought and preparation. Just in case you have not already outfitted your vehicle for an outdoor emergency, let's go over some ideas.

Give it the "function test. Before you start out on a trip, make sure everything is in good working order. Fill the washer fluid container and test the wiper blades, check the oil and make sure the air filter is clean and that the headlights and taillights are all working. Check your tire pressure and make sure the lug wrench and jack are working and in place. *Most importantly, have the battery checked*.



If it is weak, now is the time to replace it, not somewhere down the road, half way to a shoot, or when you return from a hike and find your battery dead at the trail head.

Flat tires along a major highway or roadway are not usually a serious problem, fairly easy to change or again, a call to "Triple-A" solves the problem. If your adventure takes you "Off Road" into the back country the problem becomes more serious, as nearby help is often not an option.

Include a "Tire Repair Plug Kit" (the kind with the little tar coated rope pieces) and a small cigarette-lighter air compressor (a tire pressure gauge placed where it is easily accessible). The most common tire problems off road are sidewall punctures from thorns or flint-rock fragments and a plug-kit often makes a fine temporary fix.



Your vehicle also needs a mechanical emergency kit beyond the lug

wrench and jack, particularly if your adventure is to take you to remote places. Assemble a small set of common-size wrenches, Vise-Grip pliers, some screwdrivers and a roll of electrical tape. A sturdy tow strap and jumper cables, should be stowed permanently in your rig. Trust me, you'll need them eventually! A few extra fuses is also not a bad idea.

For most archery adventures this is probably a fairly complete set up. If you are a hunter that goes beyond most archery ranges into the "back country, the a few extra items can be a life saver. A set of chains in a bucket and a shovel can get you out of some pretty miserable mud-snow-slush conditions. A few "Zip Ties" from small to large are a big asset in camp. Ditto for a hatchet or machete.

A light bar on your front bumper or on top of your rig will add a significant margin of safety on dark forest roads or when setting up camp on a moonless night. Also, very handy when processing game after dark.

Speaking of processing game after dark, a solid cooler, clean game bags, a small cutting board, rubber gloves, heavy duty gallon sized zip-close freezer bags, paper towels and some vinegar for clean up afterward, can make the job so much easier.

A "Go-Bag" is a fairly modern term for an emergency kit. Usually the best time to put together a "Go-Bag" is when your wife tells you it is time to



sort your closet. We've all been there and this is the time to put together those old jeans and t-shirt into something worthwhile. My "Go-Bag" is a "day-pack" that I have seat-belted in the back seat. It carries a light waterproof wind-breaker jacket, a hat, gloves, underwear, socks, pants and t-shirt, toothbrush/paste, a spare pair of glasses, comb, small first-aid kit (with needed daily medicines and Sun-Block lotion), flashlight (or head lamp), a small pack of tissues and a bottle of water. If you are a lady, a good addition is a pair of old sneakers or walking shoes. Should I need to walk away from the vehicle to get help, even in inclement weather, I am prepared.



A box of energy bars is always a good addition. I also have a heavyduty rain poncho and two travel blankets stored in the back.

Surprisingly enough, the storage bin under the floor in the back of my jeep is a 10" wide, 24" long and 8" deep, a small bin, but it holds 85% of all the items mentioned in this column. (*Excluding the game*

processing kit, that would be a special add on for a hunt) and the "Go Bag" in the back seat. It is true, I am probably a "little overstuffed once again, I guess that is just who I am.

You are an archer, you are expected to be prepared, resourceful and knowledgeable in all things outdoors, it is part of the life style. Set up your vehicle with the needed "stuff" and safely enjoy your archery travels!

Field practice bales this weekend, Field Range bales to follow next and when we finish with those it will be time to start all over again at the Public Session Range again. It's cooler and if you get your hours in earlier than later you aren't trying to get everything done at the last minute!

Read the flier within these pages to save the date for attending the Banquet. By popular demand we will have luncheon catered by Green Acres! Come cheer on the great archers in our club who have pushed through those hot and sticky days and persevered to be the best in the club. All members and their immediate families are welcome! I will of course be doing renewals AFTER lunch.

Be on the lookout for some Eagle Scout signage projects coming down the pipeline. We are constantly getting asked to provide more opportunities for these groups.

Hollywood Celebrity NASP Shoot

Speaking of volunteering we have our newest event on November 16, 2019. The Hollywood Celebrity NASP Shoot is our next event and will be the first time we run this one. We are working with Swan Goose Productions, who are general managers for many huge events and also archery buffs. Past member and now NFAA Hall of Fame 2020 CBH/SAA Hall of Fame Inductee – Craig Fritz is also onboard to help on this event. Look for him on the range again at the shoot. They will organize the celebrities and such and we will host the tournament part of the shoot.

This shoot is to raise monies for NASP (National Archery in the Schools Program) and promote outdoor archery, hunting activities and the Game Warden programs. Please read the media release in this Quiver to read all about the reasons behind the event.

This is really considered a short shoot as celebrities, pro archers, NASP kids and paying archers will be shooting 14-Field Targets and 15-3D targets for their final scores. This has been a nationally advertised event and media coverage will be present. With all this we of course want our range to shine and so if you see something that needs some work, be sure to let a Board member know so that it can be placed on the work party list.

Please remember that the Field, 3D and Tournament Ranges will be closed to all members. If you are not volunteering or shooting you will not be able to access the range. The Public Session will be closed for the day but open to members as of this writing. This may change if we do need to utilize that area also for specialty shots.

Along with prepping the range there is also the event itself. We will need about 35-40 volunteers to aid the teams while shooting and to be part of the security for the event. Volunteers will be served a free luncheon along with the celebs, so there will be an amount of schmoozing ability!

Volunteer Opportunities Abound!

Volunteers will be needed for:

<u>Tournament Set up</u> – Friday afternoon and Saturday morning – 10-20 volunteers

 Friday - Put out four pop up tents over seating area, place directional road signage out, place any field signage required, place tables in required areas, prep water stations for next day.
 Final clean kitchen area tables, walkways and area, clean stage seating and stage area. Prep kitchen area and turn on freezer.
 Check all bathroom facilities are ready for use. Set up Harvey at the staging area! Place paper targets on targets to be used. Set out award boxes for athletes to stand on.

- Saturday AM Set up sound system, signage, tables x2 on stage, donation tables x 3 near stage, 3 food service tables in front of service windows on kitchen walkway, pop up tents over seating area. Help to bring out donation items and processing items for archers. Set up award boxes.
- After morning presentations move Harvey to the 80-yard downhill shot.

<u>Kitchen Service</u> – 4 Volunteers for full day or partial shifts - we will be providing a small light self-service continental breakfast for the archers in the am.

Kitchen staff will need to help set up tables and covers by 7am and will oversee that the food tables are refreshed as needed for supplies. Coffee needs to be made and service set up for self-service for all food and drinks. We already have a buyer for the food in the morning. Staff will then do clean up after the morning announcements and shooters leave for the range.

Everything will then be reset for the afternoon luncheon to be served at approximately 11:30am to 12pm with the same process. Staff will receive the caterer for the food and do set up for open self-service again. After all shooters have been served then volunteers are invited to also serve themselves to a free lunch and a drink! Water will also be provided free all day.

Finally, cleanup after the luncheon.

Field Attendants: These volunteers must know how to shoot the Field or 3D Ranges well enough to explain it to new archers. We can't be sure how knowledgeable these shooters will be, so these volunteers will be their guides. We do know that some of them are very advanced or pros, and of course there will be young archers shooting also, so depending on who the shooters are will depend on the amount of help you need to give. You will either accompany a single team through a course or be staged at a specific

target to meet and explain the target to each arriving team. We will need a maximum of 14 people for the Field Range and 15 for the 3D Range. The shooters will shoot one range in the morning, break for lunch and then switch ranges after lunch to finish the shoot. Wee expect each session to be about 2-1/2 hours average.

<u>Snack Sales</u> -1 Volunteer - we will be selling just light snacks and providing free water for the returning archers through to the end of the event.

<u>Security</u> – 10 volunteers for full day or shifts. This is a celebrity event and we need to have true security help. Game Wardens will also be assisting in vital areas.

- Gate Security/Parking 2 volunteers We will have gate security checking credentials at both the Main Gate and the Tournament Range gates. Directions will be given as to process when you sign up. Media and spectators will be sent through the TR gate. All archers and volunteers will be processed through the Main gate. Guide cars to park properly.
- Roving Security will be walking the range helping to guide media and spectators and making sure that people are staying on the roads, not wandering and walking in the right directions. It will be a hand off system where you will cover an area from point to point and then hand them off to the next person so that areas are continuously covered. I ask that you bring your binoculars as we will have to watch for people trying to get onto areas they don't belong. You will be also looking for anyone in the media trying to get that "special" shot where they find themselves all of the sudden a target. Safety will be the major concern.
- Specialty Shot Assistance We will be having a few specialty shots revolving around Harvey and the Practice Area for special prizes. Helping archers get to the correct positions and scoring will be needed.

Awards Ceremonies – 2 volunteers - set up awards and assist as needed

<u>Clean Up</u> – as we will be using the 3D Range in its normal state there will not be any need to take down 3D targets!!! Best event ever!! There will be lots of other items for clean up and put away.

We normally don't post all of the specifics for what it takes to put on a tournament and all the details of the volunteers, but I wanted everyone to understand that these jobs are not beyond most anyone's abilities to help in some way. We will be needing only adult volunteers for this event please.

I hope that everyone will be make themselves available especially those of you who know the details of how to shoot the range areas. We need you all!

Cathy will be sending out the Volunteer link for this event, this week.

The exact date when people began shooting archery is debated by academics. Some say that archery began 50,000 years while others maintain that the bow and arrow are only around 10,000 years old. Recent research in South Africa reports finding bows and arrows 65,000 years old.



Archery has evolved from being the weapon that is essential for food and self defense, to being an increasingly popular sport. There were archery events in the Olympics in 1904, 1908 and 1920, but then archery did not become a regular Olympic sport for 52 years, returning in 1972. Today, over 80 nations send archery teams participate in the summer Olympics. Archery promises to be even more important in the 2020 Games.

Since 1980, the number of archers in the U.S. has gone from 3 million to more than 23 million, and as many as 1/3 of American archers are women.

One reason that there is dramatic increased interest in archery is the National Archery in the Schools Program. Since being founded in 2002 in Kentucky, NASP® has involved more than 18 million students in over 14,000 schools in 47 states, nearly all Canadian provinces, and in 10 different other countries including Africa and Australia. Currently, more than 2 million 4th-12th grade kids participate in every year. It's the largest youth archery program in history, and it's growing at 9.3% per year – about 1,000 new schools join every year. And there has never been a serious injury in a NASP® event.

According to a 2017 poll of students participating in NASP®: 58% of students feel more connected at their school; 40% of students work harder in school; 34% buy non-NASP® bows; 17.5% bow hunt and another 34% want to but haven't yet; and 20%+ hunt with firearms or want to.



NASP® is definitely one factor in the phenomenal growth of archery, but another is that we are living in the Information Age, and many heroic archers are appearing in TV and films. According to the Archery Trade Association, a big boost for women in archery came in 1999 when Oscar-winning actress Geena Davis became a semi-finalist for making the U.S. Olympic archery team. Davis says she was inspired to take up the sport by watching Olympic archers on TV. See Geena in action at this <u>fun video</u>.

A second major increase in women archers took place when the "Hunger Games" series starring Jennifer Lawrence, and "Lord of the Rings," and "Brave" were on the big screens. USA Archery membership increased by 48% after "Hunger Games" was released.

On November 16, 2019, the First Annual Hollywood Celebrity Archery Shoot will be held at Conejo Valley Archers in Simi Valley, CA. <u>https://www.cvarchers.com/</u> It will unite NASP and Hollywood directly.



This event will involve teams of celebrities, NASP archers, and supporting archers competing for prizes donated by the archery industry and others. Breakfast and lunch for archers will be free of charge.

<u>Celeb archers</u> participating in this event, include: actors Marshall and Lindy Teague, Tim Abell, Frank Stallone, Reggie Theus, Diamond Farnsworth (stunt coordinator for "NCIS"), Dr. James A Swan, and Dr. Ron Ringo; producer/directors Tom Greene and Johnny St. Ours; Fox TV wellness expert Dr. Tony O'Donnell; pro archer Dave Gore; and outdoor TV show leads Jerry Karnow, Mike Rogers and Jason Sveitch.

To participate in this event, Supporting Archers will pay a \$200 fee before November 5. After that the fee is \$250 fee each supporting archer. These monies will go to help support **NASP**[®].

What can archers win at this event?



Pitch Glue, a Native American Staple

Native American archers built all their own equipment by hand and by using materials usually near at hand. Like modern archers, some form of adhesive was a part of everyday use in assembling arrow points, spear points



or knife blades. Also used in the waterproofing of woven baskets and in any need that called for an adhesive. One of the easiest glues available was "Pitch Glue" made from pine or spruce drippings from surface scars or under damaged bark.

Pitch glue was known world wide and used by many civilizations, including our maritime ancestors who used it on ships for many little jobs, but today we are interested in how our native american tribes used pine pitch and hardened it into a usable glue.

Pine "pitch" or sap is a soft honey colored sticky substance that you will find oozing from the bark or under a damaged area of bark on a pine or spruce tree. Gathering it is just a simple process of scrapping it off the surface and putting it into a metal pot that can be heated. Check the bark closely on the pine tree at the shooting stake on target number 28, you will find some "pitch" oozing through the bark.

Once your pot is as full as you need, place it on the fire to melt. As soon as it begins to melt you will smell a strong odor of turpentine, this is normal. Don't allow the resin (sap or pitch) to boil as this will reduce the adhesive quality of the glue. You also need to have a lid for your pot within reach as the resin can catch on fire easily and the lid will smother the fire in the pot. If you need extremely clean glue you can "quickly" strain the soft liquid into another warm pot before it cools in the strainer. For most outdoor projects, straining is probably not necessary.

The resin, if left on its own, will just simply return to its natural soft sticky state as it cools, so it must be tempered to harden it and make it useful as a glue. There are three common substances and two are easily acquired in the field and work well to temper the glue, each has its own advantage. Powdered charcoal is the most common simply because it is already present in the coals of your warming fire. Charcoal works well for most uses, though it tends to make the glue a bit brittle after awhile, it also turns the glue black in color. Beeswax makes a softer more flexible glue, not as strong a glue as charcoal and tends to feel a little greasy and softer when set. Beeswax is also not usually as easy to acquire in the field. Perhaps the better temper is powdered dry scat (poop) from herbivores such as the many cottontails or occasional deer that passes through our range. Simply grind the very dry "scat" or pellets into a fine powder. Often referred to as "loaded" glue, it does make the strongest and longest-lasting glue. Not as hygienic as other tempers, so don't use it for repair of eating utensils, etc.

Since we are talking of using natural products, it is sometimes hard to judge the amount of temper needed to make our glue set properly. Some experimentation is required here, a simple rule of thumb is to start with about 10% temper and set a little aside to harden, if it remains a little soft add a little more temper. The glue must be hot to spread and adhesion only happens once it has cooled. The more times you heat the glue the weaker the adhesion and the more brittle it will get, so when you make your first batch any leftover glue should be divided up into small portions.

The easiest way to do this is to make "pitch-sticks." Pitch sticks can be made using twigs found nearby or I prefer using "popsicle sticks" that can be picked up in any hobby or school supply store. Have a second pot nearby with cool or cold water in it, dip your twig or stick into the warmed soft glue much as you would if dipping a candle, and then dip it into the cool water to harden, dip again and again cool as many times as necessary to have the amount you need for your next project.



When you wish to use the glue, you can heat the glue "glob" on the end of your stick and drip it onto the surface needing glue. It often helps to pre-heat the surfaces of the parts that need gluing to get an easier and better bond. In the "old days" every archer had a small glass alcohol burner on his workbench, it worked well for "pitch glue" or point glue which is very similar. Still have mine on the bench, haven't used it for years, but I keep it for its nostalgia value.

There you have it. Simple and useful and no expensive tools needed, so give it a try. It's the way "Ishi" * made glue, I know you can do it too!

Now this glue can be a sticky and a bit messy the first few times you try, so you will need a way to clean up your fingers, etc. until you get better at it. This solution is so simple I bet you have the remedy in your glove box, purse or just laying around nearby. Can you guess?

Hand sanitizer! The chemical needed is isopropyl alcohol, the main ingredient in hand-sanitizer, also found on most archers work benches.

JOAD – Always on Point

Under the guidance of Coach Ken Downey, the Conejo Valley Archers Junior Olympic Archery Development has been growing!

JOAD has seen some dynamic growth with some wonderful archers being developed. A little over two years ago, Coach Ken Downey grabbed his quiver, bow and years of experience and applied it to educating young archers. During this time, JOAD has grown from a half a dozen kids to almost 25 on a weekly basis. When asked, Coach Ken will proudly and comically state that he is here to deflate the kid's egos and get them ready for archery tournaments. Coach Ken applies his witty banter, life stories and boisterous humor to create a fun and lively atmosphere that engages the kids, teaches the fundamentals of archery and develops Top Tier junior archers.

Over the last year, Ken has prepped a couple of archers to compete in the State Games as well as the Vegas Shoot. Eleven-year-old, Harley Kenney has been a stand out archer and has competed at several elite tournaments across California and Nevada. Like all sports, Coach Ken touts that practice is needed in order to compete and he provides his students with instruction and skills on how to do so at home, even with limited space or resources.

Every Saturday at 0900, Coach Ken begins the kids with warm-ups and "Story Time with Ken," his weekly dissertation on fun and enlightening events while the kids stretch. After stretches the kids listen for the safety whistles and begin the day's lesson. Ken works down the shooting line providing guidance and form critique with focused areas for each student. The day typically consists of working on form, learning the proper etiquette of tournaments, keeping score and entertaining shoots. These entertaining shoots consist of balloons at various distances, Kids Vs. Coach, and themed holiday shoots. Recently, the range mats were decorated with a variety of Halloween targets, spooky music and of course candy and treats.



Rishi Deshpande, JOAD Student Spotlight

This month JOAD is featuring a Student Spotlight: Rishi Deshpande. Rishi is a 13-year-old resident of Simi Valley attending Hillside Middle School and shoots a 64" Olympic Recurve with a 20# draw weight. The Value of Involvement

Every year the club roster membersip swells with new or recently joined members. If you are one of them there is a good chance that you have been



approached by a club officer who asks if you would volunteer for some event, office or detail. It may not seem so at first, but this is a good thing and over the long term will provide you with many new friends and great memories.

There is "value of involvement" as a member and it is perhaps just a beginning of where volunteering can take you.

Each year I feel an obligation to inform our new archers or members of what opportunities lay beyond being a member of our wonderful club. Being a member of CVA is an open door to other organizations, memories and experiences.

Now truth be told, I am lazy and don't always follow through with this self-imposed responsibility, this is just a fact. However, this year was an accumulation of great memories for me, a result of many years of involvement in and beyond the club. It occurred to me that if I shared some of these memories, I might just be a bit more effective at explaining "the value of involvement", and that there are rewards and memories to be made while promoting archery at various levels of organization.

This last spring while attending a combination conference of the Pope & Young Club's 36th bi-annual convention and the National Bowhunter Education Foundation (NBEF) 40th anniversary celebration in Omaha, Nebraska (*I am a member of both organizations,*) *a* realization of how fortunate I have been to be an active part of these groups began to settle in my mind.

At these gatherings many archers receive all matter of awards, most times for accomplishment in the field, other awards are for service to the archery community, fund raising for scholarships for young archers, etc. I was not a receiver of awards or recognition. I did however spend time with great NBEF friends and fellow bowhunters from Sweden to Alaska, South Dakota to Massachusetts and more.



"Sharing the Journey with the Best of the Best"

I met and spent time with a phenomenal collector of Bear Bows, attended seminars given by top bowhunter and bow maker South Cox, chatted with manufacturers, and in the end even the Secret Service Agent allowed me to shake Donald Trump Jr's hand when he stopped at our Bowhunter Education booth on his way as our featured speaker. It was then that I began to reflect on just how I got from being a skinny kid flinging arrows at sage-hen's in the Wyoming sagebrush to participating in the largest gathering ever held of the world's best bowhunters and bowhunter educators. It was a simple journey, as I liked being involved with archers and archery. It was a path that was taken as it came, as I had no goals, dreams or aspirations other than to enjoy the natural world with bow in hand and to share it with like-minded souls.



Curtis - When it all started (eleven or twelve)

In 1953 I joined the Pronghorn Archers of Gillette, Wyoming, a brand-new club, so I was a founding member. I was eleven, and being a "founding member" didn't register in my mind, what did I know at that age. Three years later with help from our coach and club president I had become the youth state champion for both 1955 and 1956. Then my family was to move to Texas, in response to my leaving, I was voted in as a life member of the Pronghorn Archers. Again, at the time, I gave these events little thought, but today they are some of my earliest and important moments and memories. I realize they set the pattern of my willingness to be involved in any group that was willing to promote archery and bowhunting, it was just the first step of a long and rewarding journey.

So from those humble beginnings, to now in my 77 year, I look back at all the positions held, hours put in, ideas (both good and bad) presented, friends made while attempting to move the archery world forward and realize that it has been a great journey, a journey that has no end and will simply be passed on to another like-minded archer.

There are many archery organizations in which you may join to enhance your archery experience, each one will be dedicated to promoting a style or method of shooting or hunting. It will benefit you to join, get involved and learn from such an organization. There are also some organizations that you may not have a need to join but you should know about and understand just what they do to promote our sport. I would like to discuss some organizations today that have given me more in experiences, memories and friendships than I ever imagined could happen to an archer.

It all starts of course with your local club, volunteering an becoming a member of the board will make you aware of the relationship between the club and the state organization. In our case that is CBH/SAA or California Bowman Hunters / State Archery Association. Once you represent your club at a state archery association meeting you become aware of the relationship of the state archery association with the national archery organization (in our case that is the NFAA or National Field Archery Association), its relationship with the state's Department of Fish & Wildlife and with bowhunter education or the NBEF or National Bowhunter Education Foundation. In each of these positions you will meet people, make friends, and expand your experience and understanding. Somewhere along this progression you will gravitate in one direction or another toward a niche that fits you. Once you settle in to your niche many new adventures begin!

The NBEF came to our club in 1983. Walt Powell from the Pasadena Roving Archers, put on the first bowhunter education class. I signed up and after the class, and volunteered as an instructor. I think early on I felt that this is where I belonged. It is hard to imagine that event of thirty-six years ago lead to ten years on the board of CBH/SAA as State Chairman of Bowhunter Education, which lead to ten years as a columnist for the National Bowhunter magazine and then to a regional coordinator position over seven western states for the NBEF, but it did and here I am working a conference in Omaha! I think the kid from Wyoming is feeling very blessed.

Was it all worthwhile? You bet it was, and I wouldn't trade it for anything. The memories would fill volumes, that is if I could put them all together in a column like this one. I encourage you to give it a try as the "value of involvement" is "the enrichment of life" and that is a "Win, win" in anybody's book!

Welcome to the December issue of the Conejo Valley Archers Quiver Newsletter.





Scott Leviant on the CVA Spring Classic

Greetings fellow CVA members.

I've been the CVA Secretary for a little over a year now. But, aside from attending to my specific obligations as an Officer of the club, I haven't had anything of major note to announce. Until now. As part of my big announcement, I need to ask for your help.



First, some historical context is in order. When Clark Pentico moved out of the area, CVA lost its Tournament Director for the annual event known as the Pacific Coast Archery Festival. And, while I had thought for some time that I would like to be involved in tournament management, stepping into Clark's shoes was a big decision. However, after many months of consideration, and with 2020 rapidly approaching, I jumped into the deep end and just offered to serve as the Tournament Director for the Pacific Coast Archery Festival...with no prior tournament administration experience. Right.

The event previously known as the "Pacific Coast Archery Festival" is now known as the 2020 Conejo Valley Archers Spring Classic ("CVA Spring Classic"). As in years past, the CVA Spring Classic is a two-day archery festival that offers participants the opportunity to shoot in any or all of three distinct tournaments: an American 900 Round, a 3-D Round, and a NFAA Field Round. But we are upgrading a lot more than just the name of our event. This year, we are offering prize money open classes for men and women in each of the three separate tournaments that make up the two-day CVA Spring Classic, with a minimum guaranteed total prize money pot of \$2,100 (at last check, the prize money pot is up to \$2,600). And, if you are a returning competitor, rest assured that we will still have all of the non-money divisions offered in years past.

I am using the CVA Spring Classic as a chance to improve upon CVA's tournament administration tool set. You can now pre-register by submitting your pre-registration form by email to CVASC@CVArchers.com. And, more importantly, pre-registration payments can be submitted through PayPal. Just use PayPal to send your payment to CVAPay@CVArchers.com. If you take advantage of the early registration and payment options, discounts are available, including a discount for pre-registering by February 29, 2020, and a bigger discount for pre-registering *and* then paying through PayPal by February 1, 2020. As we learn what works, we will implement PayPal pre-registration payments for other tournaments.

Now that you know the *what* of that with which I need help (the CVA Spring Classic), I need to tell you how you can help. The CVA Spring Classic needs the support of sponsors. I am working to involve major archery equipment companies, but we need more sponsorship support. If you work for a business that would be willing to sponsor the event, make that pitch. Sponsors will receive recognition on the event webpage at CVArchers.com, and they will receive promotion at the CVA Spring Classic, including through signage indicating sponsorship of lanes or targets at the event. If you are the owner of a business, then make the pitch to yourself, approve it, and sponsor the CVA Spring Classic. The donations of sponsors will offset expenses for range grooming, premium food options, and high-quality awards. In addition, sponsorship funds will increase the size of the money class prize money pot. If you have questions about sponsorship opportunities, email or call me. In addition to sponsors, the CVA Spring Classic needs volunteers, and the more competitors we attract, the more volunteer help will be needed. If you are not planning to shoot all three tournaments at the CVA Spring Classic (and you really should be thinking about participating in at least one), some volunteer assistance will be greatly appreciated by your club, your fellow club members, and the visiting competitors (who will appreciate attending a well-run event). Volunteer opportunities will be coordinated through Cathy Linson, so read her emails instead of immediately hitting the delete button.

As not what your club can do for you; ask what you can do for your club. I look forward to seeing you shooting and/or working at the CVA Spring Classic.

CATHY'S CORNER

The board has been discussing increasing the required hours for working memberships. If we make a change it would go into effect in October 2020 assuming the membership votes yes.

Basically, the issue is that it takes 6000-7000 hours of work to keep the range up, run the club and put on events. At 12 hours per membership we get about 1500 hours. There are a group of folks who put in more hours that are required but not enough. That leaves a handful of folks working 300-450 hours each year. Burn out is real folks.

We are considering things like increasing all required hours and requiring more hours from family memberships than from single memberships. We are also looking at contracting out the upkeep of the Tournament Range and grants from Cal Fire to pay for outsourcing weed abatement.

If you have any thoughts or ideas, now is the time to speak. Talk to any board member. Something has to change, what we do now is not sustainable.

A Few Pics from the Spark of Love Tournament

CRAFTING THE PRECISION MADE ARROW

A column for the "Conejo Quiver" by Curtis Hermann, Dec. 2019

PART ONE OF THREE

Learning the value of crafting the precision-made arrow must be one of the most difficult lessons in archery, at least if you measure it by the number of



archers that actually practice the craft. If I estimated that one in a hundred archers actually crafted a top end arrow, I would be very generous indeed, especially in this era of "factory madeeverything".

If you are consistently shooting "golf ball sized groups" at 40 yards, well perhaps you should be the one writing this column. If however, you are shooting softball sized groups at fifty and sixty yards, instead of baseball sized groups, then perhaps a few pointers here might be of some help in reducing your group size. You see the purpose of crafting the precision-made arrow is to take your accuracy to the next level! Side effects are, increased confidence, improved focus on form, and more enjoyment of archery!

Robin Hood understood this, archers for a thousand years before him did as well, as did Howard Hill (the world's foremost archer). Yahi Indian, Ishi, understood this as well, having reportedly said "Any stick will work for bow but it is arrows that kill deer". It was from the above sources that I began to learn the value of the well-made or precision crafted arrow. Howard was my hero as a young man and I absorbed everything he wrote, here was his method. Howard bought only premium Port Orford cedar shafts by the gross (that's 144), out of this 144 he would straighten, weigh and spine test them in groups and select the best five dozen. The rejects were sold to the nearby archery shop. Of these approximate five dozen he would again straighten, weigh, sand and spine test them into tighter groups in hopes of ending up with the best three dozen (all within one or two grains of each other and two to three pounds of spine). One dozen (the very best) would become tournament and trick shooting arrows, the second dozen for hunting and the third dozen went into the rabbit arrow box. All of these three dozen arrows were far superior to the arrows the average archer was shooting. (Perhaps that is why Howard won 197 field archery tournaments in a row without a second place among them.) The two-dozen left over were used for customers to use in his shop to test shoot some of his bows. This method was well beyond my financial resources, I had to be satisfied with the purchase of two dozen shafts and I had to use them all. Fortunately, the local shop was our neighbor and he allowed me to spine test, weigh and straighten shafts in the shop all afternoon and pick out my two dozen.

Today's arrow components are far superior in strength, straightness and more closely matched in spine and weight than Port Orford Cedar. You can purchase factory made arrows superior in all aspects to what I (or Robin Hood or Howard Hill) could build in the old days. That being said: to take your accuracy to the next level still requires the same attention to detail in the manufacture of arrow components that can rarely be found in a factory-made arrow or found on a pro-shop shelf. *You must take charge with the zest of a perfectionist and build them yourself!*

So, lets us get into the tools, the techniques and a little inside info into the making of a better arrow that will improve your score and your archery life.

1). In arrow making, straightness is primo, straightness today comes in several groups, perfectly straight to 2, 3 - 5 and 5 - 6. You are interested in 2 or better for tournament and 3 for hunting, 5-6 go into the rabbit arrow box. Yes, you can buy these where it says on the box the straightness rating your looking for, but that is only

the starting point. I use an Arizona arrow straightener that will read in thousands of an inch over a ten inch span, so I must test each shaft in three sections (middle and each end), better or at least easier machines are made today by Ram, Easton or Bear Paw that can read over a 28" span. The point is that most shafts will have a little wobble at the ends and once in a while in the middle, you will trim off the end with the most wobble or a little off each end (it's a judgement call), if it wobbles in the center, then the rabbit arrow box is in order. Hint: always clean the rollers on your machine so that no specks of dust remain to give you a false reading, I use 90% rubbing alcohol.

Now I can hear some of you say "I can't tell the difference in my score between a 2 arrow and a 5 arrow!," I hear you, and it certainly seems that way, but look at it this way, when that win is one arrow inside the line as opposed to that one arrow outside the line, my bet is on the 2 or better arrow to win!

2). With the same machines above you can read the arrow spine deflection. Spine deflection is the amount an arrow bends or flexes in tenths of an inch underweight. The Archery Manufacturers Association (AMO) uses a 1.94-pound weight in the center of an arrow spanned across 28 inches. So, a 500 spine flexes 5/10's or 1/2 ", a 400 - 4/10's, a 300 -3/10's, etc. I use a spine tester originally designed for wood arrows, so I must adjust some, fortunately experience has taught me how. You are going to look for two things: (1) each shaft must be within a few thousands of an inch from the manufacturers stated spine rating, and more importantly, (2) you're looking for very little difference in spine deflection around the circumference of the entire shaft.

Use a silver sharple to mark the spot on each shaft closest to the desired spine reading, you will then use this marking to align your cock feather when fletching. Carbon or aluminum are both natural materials, even though they have been highly processed they will have variances, our job is to minimize those variances.

There are three other ways to do this: (1) Use a shooting machine and test for dynamic spine (sadly I don't know of anybody with a shooting machine), (2) Bathtub float test, apply a nock to each end of the shaft, fill the tub with 6" of water, add a little Dawn Dish Soap to make the water slick, place the shaft in the water and spin, when it settles the heavy or stiff side will be down or at 6 o'clock, the light or weak side will be up at 12 o'clock. This will only tell you the weak and stiff side of the arrow, but not how stiff or weak from arrow to arrow. (3) If you are a real consistent shot (golf ball sized groups at 40 yards) you can nock tune arrows by shooting "numbered" arrows and noting any arrows that are not grouping right. This is where we twist the nock and shoot again (an again), and continue until it joins the group. This is similar to using a shooting machine, except you are using form instead of a machine to verify dynamic spine (how the arrow flexes during launch).

3). Matching shaft weight: It is true that most archers cannot tell the difference in the flight of an arrow over sixty yards that may vary as much as ten grains from one shaft to the next shaft, that being said we are trying here to raise the standard of what is acceptable in a matched set of arrows. Gravity is a constant, so we know an arrow that weighs ten grains more is going to drop an imperceptible amount over a 60-yard span, is it a 1/2", a 1/4", an eighth inch? I don't know? My thought is, if it is 1/8" below the spot and it is 10 grains heavier than the arrow in the spot, then we have just lost a point unnecessarily. So, what changes when you tighten the variables, is a slight increase in confidence. Just knowing how close your arrows are matched means you know your groups are going to tighten and you have that advantage over the next guy. So, the goal here is to get a completed set of arrows that will not vary more than 2-3 grains over a dozen. To reach that goal we must start with shafts that are very close in weight.



Arrow making tools for part 1


- 1. Cut Off Saw (straddling note pad & pen)
- 2. Digital Weight Scale with block & rubber band (left of saw)
- 3. Arizona Straightener (upper left) used to check straightness and wobble at shaft ends)
- 4. Spine tester (behind note pad) to check spine (flex) around the diameter of shaft as well as shaft to shaft.
- 5. Silver Sharpie (not shown) for marking the point where spine desired is found on shaft.

Almost everybody today uses a digital scale, they are accurate, inexpensive and compact. In addition to a scale you will need a trough or a rubber band and the weight of these must be subtracted from the read out. You can also recalibrate the scale to zero with the trough or rubber band on the scale and skip the math.

Most carbon shafts are very close in weight so adjustments are small and may only require a little sanding on the ends or the removal of a 1/16th inch or so with your cut off saw. I always find the balance point on the shaft by laying it across my index finger, then I pick up the shaft at the balance point and center it on the trough or rubber band on the scale. Keeping a list of the weight of each shaft is important as we will adjust total arrow weight by selecting carefully the components that we add to the shaft.

We will talk arrow cutting technique plus components next month, nocks, vanes, inserts, points and wraps will be covered.
